

Though the 2021 fiscal year did not bring the end of the COVID-19 pandemic, the South Carolina AHEC System was able to continue our commitment to building and supporting the healthcare workforce in South Carolina. We have adapted to an everchanging environment in order to meet the needs of students and health professionals statewide. By providing a range of remote, in-person, and hybrid programming, we have ensured that high school and college students are supported in pursuit of health careers, health professions students are able to fulfill their training requirements, and health professionals are connected both with the communities that need them and the training they need to ensure their continued licensure and certifications. We are proud to continue serving with the state's institutions of higher education, healthcare providers, community partners and others to improve the diversity, distribution and training of South Carolina's healthcare workforce.



South Carolina AHEC follows the state fiscal calendar: FY21 includes July 2020 through June 2021.


State Funding

Regional Highlights

Each of South Carolina AHEC's four regional centers serves an 11- or 12-county region of the state where they connect students to health careers, health professionals to communities and communities to better health. The centers do this through collaboration with healthcare entities, high schools and colleges, graduate health professions programs and other community partners. Together, the four centers serve all 46 counties in South Carolina.

Lowcountry AHEC | Walterboro | Icahec.com

In order to meet the needs of healthcare professionals during the COVID-19 pandemic, Lowcountry AHEC focused on developing and providing webbased continuing professional development programming. This strategy continued and expanded upon efforts from 2020 to pivot programs online and Lowcountry AHEC was successfully able to provide 55 webinar CPD programs to health professionals across the state, supporting their continued training and licensure requirements.





Mid-Carolina AHEC | Lancaster | midcarolinaahec.org

Mid-Carolina AHEC supported front-line healthcare professionals and health professions student education by facilitating student clinical experiences at regional COVID-19 vaccination clinics and free clinics. The partnerships provide needed additional staffing capacity at these sites while also helping students gain important clinical experience. In these capacities, students gained a better understanding of the diversity of the community's population and the health issues patients regularly face. These training placements supported the community while providing invaluable clinical experience to students.

Pee Dee AHEC | Florence | peedeeahec.net

Pee Dee AHEC developed its Pathways to Medicine program to support undergraduate students who may need guidance, resources, and support in their pursuit of health careers. The program provides guidance for admissions requirements, resources for test preparation and opportunities for job shadowing and observation, mentorship, and more. Last fiscal year, two students in the program were accepted into medical school and a third has obtained employment as a certified nursing assistant while completing undergraduate courses and preparing for the MCAT.





Upstate AHEC | Greenville | upstateahec.org

Upstate AHEC partnered with the Urban League of the Upstate's Project Ready talent search program and UofSC School of Medicine Greenville's Minority Student Outreach to establish a Health Careers Club. The club matches high school students with medical students for mentorship and provides opportunities for the high school students to prepare for college entry, go on campus tours, prepare for ACT/SAT testing, build soft skills and more. Participating medical students also receive training to prepare them for mentorship. The project, which kicked off with a virtual recruitment mixer in the fall, provides these high school students with valuable support on their paths to health careers.


South Carolina AHEC Scholars Program

The AHEC Scholars Program prepares students for interprofessional primary care practice and service to rural and underserved populations. Overall, 125 students have enrolled in the program from 8 different disciplines and 6 educational institutions.

Connecting Physicians to Family Medicine Training

Family medicine physicians provide lifelong care for the entire family, making them an important asset for the health of communities, especially in rural areas where they can practice comprehensive, full-scope medicine.



South Carolina AHEC has been instrumental in helping the Family Medicine residency programs of South Carolina in recruiting excellent medical students to their programs over the last year. During the time of COVID-19 surges and the changes that this has created, all of the residency programs rapidly switched to virtual interviews and virtual recruiting fairs during the summer and fall of 2021. With the help of those at the SC AHEC, we recruited as a state group at ^{2019 Family Medicine Interest Day} the AAFP's national medical student meeting- usually held in Kansas City but

now held virtually in 2020 and 2021. Also, the SC AHEC funded and provided technical expertise to convert our statewide Family Medicine Interest Day in August of 2020 and 2021 to a virtual recruiting fair. These opportunities, even when converted to a virtual platform, provide our state's Family Medicine residencies the opportunity to recruit both within SC and throughout the entire United States, and they clearly wouldn't have occurred without AHEC's support. These recruiting activities pay dividends not only to the programs for the next three years (in terms of recruiting exceptional medical students to train in SC), but also for the state's population as graduates of our residencies have a high likelihood of practicing in South Carolina and benefiting our citizens. Working together as a team with the SC AHEC is a "win-win" for our residency programs, medical students throughout the country, and in providing for future medical care for the people of our state.

South Carolina AHEC Recruitment and Retention Programs utilize financial incentives to build an effective healthcare workforce to address the maldistribution of clinicians in rural and underserved areas of South Carolina.



I consider myself very lucky to have been selected to participate in the South Carolina Rural Dentist Program. Receiving funding has allowed me to practice in an area where there is more of a need for dental services, and I have been able to give back to many individuals who could not find an in-network provider for their dental work. We have been able to complete many procedures including extractions, root canals, restorative work, dentures, and more, to many people who did not have access to care, and that has been incredibly rewarding. Had I not been given the opportunity to participate in the program my educational debt may have hindered my ability to practice in a rural community, and I am very thankful for the support of the program which has allowed me to treat patients in these areas.

AHEC continuing education programs provide a local and low-cost approach to the education needed for health professionals to maintain their licensure and certifications and practice high-quality healthcare.





SCOHW, a division of South Carolina AHEC, studies issues that affect the balance of supply and demand for different types of healthcare professionals across South Carolina. SCOHW develops accurate, reliable information about the healthcare workforce in South Carolina and makes that information widely available to support planning and policy decisions.
